Mock Trial in Business Law

In the fall, students in Mrs. Wagner's Business Law I class staged a mock trial based on a school theft scenario with Mr. Ekis's weightlifting class acting as the jury. The "attorney's" for both the plaintiff and defendant followed the procedures in a criminal case trial and presented their case with opening statements, questioned witnesses, presented evidence, and then summarized their side of the case in closing arguments.

The sitting judge, a student from study hall, then instructed the jury as to the rules of law to apply to the case and what issues of fact had to be decided. The jury deliberated for a short time and returned with a verdict of "not guilty by reasonable doubt". Although the jurors were convinced that the perpetrators of the theft were actually guilty, they did not feel that the plaintiff had provided enough evidence or witness testimony to meet the required 90% to support a guilty verdict.

And so the defendants were released from detainment and the judge and jury were rewarded with candy for their willingness to miss a day of class to perform their civic duty.

PATRIOT'S PEN

With great pride, I am happy to recognize eighth grader Hannah Stirn for placing third in the state of Ohio for her Patriot's Pen essay entitled How Can I be a Good American?

Each year more than 125,000 students in grades 6-8 enter the VFW's Patriot's Pen youth essay contest. The first-place winner from each state competes for national awards totaling \$50,000, with each first-place state winner receiving a minimum of \$500 at the national level. The national first-place winner wins \$5,000 and an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., in March.

The essay contest encourages young minds to examine America's history by drafting a 300- to 400-word essay, expressing their views based on a patriotic theme chosen by the VFW Commander-in-Chief.

ALLEN COUNTY MUSEUM TRAVELING TRUNK

Spencerville third grade students their understanding of Pioneer customs, traditions, and entertainment through the Allen County Museum traveling trunk presentation. Students saw Christmas decorations used during the 1800's such as pinecones, popcorn, paper chains, apples, berries, candles, and homemade ornaments. Students learned about the first Christmas cards that were an English custom beginning around 1843. They shared traditions of Santa with early customs from the Dutch, and read parts of the traditional story, Twas the Night Before Christmas. The museum brought several toys that the pioneers used for entertainment or could have received as a gift for Christmas. Many of the toys were made of wood or items found in nature. Students were able to play with the pioneer toys and enjoy the simplicity of pioneer entertainment. The third grade students would like to thank the Allen County Museum for coming to our school and volunteering their time and expertise to give our students a wonderful hands-on experience.

YOUTH AND GOVERNMENT

The Spencerville Youth and Government program is ready to begin another year. Students have been busy writing their bills to present at the mock legislature in Columbus at the end of the March. This year we have 39 students in the program. Most of the students are juniors with a handful of seniors. The bills this year cover an array of topics as in past years. We have a couple of bills introducing recycling programs to reduce the use of plastics. We have a bill to add changing tables and family restrooms to public places to ensure both mothers and fathers have safe places to assist their small children when necessary. There are other bills looking at expanding seat belt laws, drug testing for high school athletes, and other issues that the students felt needed addressed. We are currently doing practice debates to strengthen our bills looking for areas where we need clarification and to close loopholes. The students have been practicing the Legislative Procedure as we debate the bills. They will be more than ready to face their committees and assemblies when we head to Columbus.

We are very excited because, as of right now, the Ohio YMCA is planning on running the program like normal in Columbus. Students will spend three days in Columbus where they will get to hold their mock legislature in the actual Ohio Statehouse. The extended weekend starts with a luncheon on Thursday where they get to meet Representatives from the Ohio General Assembly and hear different speeches encouraging them to be active citizens. After lunch, one of the justices of the Ohio Supreme Court comes to the Statehouse to welcome them and officially swear them in for the YMCA Mock Legislature. Then, they will spend the rest of the day and all day Friday sitting in committees and in full sessions of student legislatures presenting their bills as well as debating the bills from students all over the state. For a student, nothing brings the government to life like actually sitting in the Senate or House of Representative chambers arguing their own bills using the Legislative Procedure. Saturday morning brunch is spent holding elections for the 2023 leaders of the Mock Legislature as well as hearing certain bills to practice the power of overriding a veto. It is a weekend full of unforgettable experiences.

The program is looking for people to sponsor our group financially. With the return of the full extended weekend, the price of participating can be a lot. MIDDLE SCHOOL STEM CLUB WINS OHIO STEM CLASSROOM GRANT

Spencerville Middle School will be awarded \$5,000 in February to expand STEM learning projects through Ohio STEM Learning Network Classroom Grant Program, funded by Battelle. The grant will create sustainable, STEM learning projects to benefit students for years to come.

In total, 151 classrooms across 55 Ohio counties join Spencerville in winning the award.

STEM Club: Science To Empower to the MAX!

The Middle School STEM Club is back for a second year. The club invites 7th and 8th graders with an interest in science, but they need no prior experience. STEM club offers its members a great place to take initiative and discover engineering through the engagement of hands-on projects. Our focus is hands-on projects which go above and beyond the curriculum.

We will be running different 4-5 week sessions throughout the school year. Students are able to join us when they are interested in a topic and are not required to attend all topics. Our goal is to introduce our students to a variety of STEM fields and inspire them to look into different careers.

This year we kicked off our sessions by inviting Detective Jack Miller in to discuss crime scene investigation. Detective Miller spent just over an hour speaking with students about what he does in his field and how they go about collecting evidence when a crime happens. Students asked lots of great questions and are excited to begin their own investigations.

As an advisor and science teacher, I like that all my students have the opportunity to explore and produce activities that help make them interested in science and focus on STEM fields in their future career. We recognize that our students work very hard and do not want these tests to cause anxiety. We would like you to discuss the importance of the tests with your child, as they are important to our district. They allow us to analyze the effectiveness of our academic programs and make needed changes to ensure our students are getting the best education possible. For the high school classes, this is a requirement for graduation. You can help alleviate any stress your child may feel by making sure he or she gets adequate sleep the night before and proper nutrition the morning of his or her test.

I know the seniors are counting down the days until graduation and while it seems like a long way off, it will be here before we know it. Graduation will be held Sunday, May 29th at 2pm in the competition gym. Just a reminder, school, athletic, and Apollo fees will need to be taken care of by May 1st.


GUYS WITH TIES
